



BUDGET REPORT 2017-18







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am pleased to present the 2017-18 budget for the Lloydminster Public School Division (LPSD). This budget was developed with an eye to the future of LPSD, while being mindful of the economic realities that we face.

For the 2017-18 year, funding available to LPSD will be reduced by approximately 2%. This decrease is due to a reduction in grant funding from the Government of Saskatchewan, with no funding increases were from the Government of Alberta.

In developing this budget, the Board of Education and Senior Administration developed a clear set of philosophy statements that helped guide how it was built. One of these statements was to ensure the required reductions did not impact the organization's ability to meet its key priorities, pursue innovation and build capacity in staff. I feel that this budget not only meets, but exceeds this expectation.





The 2017-18 budget includes a number of key programming changes including:

- Redevelopment of the Hockey Academy program,
- Introduction of a Junior Kindergarten program for 4-year old children, and
- New ECO 9 program at E.S. Laird Middle School

LPSD met the challenge of a reduced budget

with more opportunities for both our families and staff by redirecting how we provide services. By focusing supports and resources on new initiatives and programs, and the continued development of educational opportunities for staff, I am pleased to know that Lloyd Public will continue to grow and put students first.

REVENUES and EXPENDITURES

he Lloydminster Public School Division (LPSD) is expecting a decrease in its revenues for the 2017-18 fiscal year, seeing a proposed budget of \$42.3 million. The majority of that figure came from grants, which totalled \$26.9 million, followed by property taxes at \$13.3 million.

LPSD is expecting expenses to be reduced for the 2017-18 school year, totalling \$42.3 million. Instruction made the top of that list, with a total expenditure line of nearly \$32.7 million, followed \$5.1 million on Plant Operations and Maintenance and \$2 million on Governance and Administration.

INNOVATION and NEW INITIATIVES

hile the 2017-18 budget did provide for some challenges for the Lloydminster Public School Division (LPSD), resources were found to help provide some new and innovative initiatives. Starting in the 2017-18 School Year, LPSD will begin offering a Junior Kindergarten program for up to 80 four-yearold children. This new program will expand on what LPSD is able to offer through the Prekindergarten program and reach more families than before.

LPSD is also making some changes to its Hockey Academy program and adding new programs at the middle school level to bring indemand programs to the students that need them.

In addition to these new programs, the Board of Education is looking to September 2018 and beyond has challenged senior administration to continue looking for new and innovative programming. To do this, the Board has allocated some of its resources to support the training and development of staff and facility upgrades to make these new programs a success.

These innovations and new initiatives allow LPSD to continue providing the great level of service its families have come to expect, while also meeting budgetary demands.



ENROLMENT and STAFFING

he Lloydminster Public School Division's (LPSD) enrolment has saw steady growth in since 2012 and the division is expecting those numbers to stabilize into 2017-18. For the 2017-18 fiscal year, it is expected that enrolment will sit at approximately 4,166 students in September, 2017, up from 4,163 students in the previous September. Of that figure, it is anticipated that 43% will live in Saskatchewan and 57% will reside in Alberta.



STAFFING

LPSD's budgeted full-time equivalent (FTE) for all staff in the 2017-18 fiscal year sits at 452.03 FTE, with 56% of that being dedicated towards teaching staff.

FACILITIES

ore than \$2.3 million is expected to be spent this year on Facility Projects through Alberta's Infrastructure Maintenance and Renewal (IMR) and Saskatchewan's Preventative Maintenance Renewal (PMR) programs. In total, the Lloydminster Public School Division will receive approximately \$927,000 through IMR funding and \$315,000 through PMR funding.

It is expected that five major projects and 10 minor projects will be completed through IMR, PMR and division funding.

Last fiscal year, six major projects and eight minor projects were completed through IMR, PMR and division funding, as well as through Board of Education reserves.
